The Editor

Policy and Research

The South African Council for Educators (SACE) is a statutory self-regulatory body with mandates of setting and maintaining professional and ethical standards in the teaching profession, thus it has heightened the process of professionalising the teaching profession to enhance its standing, status, and internal quality across the teacher education and development continuum. This publication focuses on acknowledging teachers' best practices concerning their professional teacher development. The SACE Continuing Professional Teacher Development system has been designed in terms of the Minister of Education's National Policy Framework for Teacher Education and Development (NPFTED, 26 April 2007). The National Policy Framework on Teacher Education Development, Section 53 states: SACE will have the overall responsibility for the implementation, management, and quality assurance of the CPTD System.

The vision of the CPTD system is to support and facilitate a process of purposeful, high-quality continuing professional development for all registered educators, to revitalise the teaching profession and to reward teachers who commit themselves to these goals. The new CPTD system will be built around priorities identified by individual teachers, by school leadership teams and staff members collectively, and priorities identified by SACE, the Department of Education, and other national bodies for the profession.

In support of the teacher development initiatives, SACE held its inaugural national teachers' conference on the 20th and 21st of April 2023 at the Birchwood Hotel and OR Tambo in Boksburg. SACE managed to create a successful platform and safe space for teachers to raise their voices individually and collectively during and beyond the conference. The conference was also an opportunity to recognise and award forty-five (45) educators who garnered way beyond the required number of professional development points earned every three-year cycle for the CPTD system was also honoured. Subsequently, 21 female school leaders who wrote a short story book titled Women Unveiling Untold Stories in the Education Sector were recognised.



The Council continues to advocate the presidential and ministerial priority on reading. Through the Department of Basic Education, the Director General's (DG) Engagements with Provincial officials and School Principals to deliberate in the International Reading Literacy Study (PIRLS). Council embarked on the journey, alongside DG to present the SACE virtual library which includes digital reading content of more than 50 000 books available for teachers.

As the Council of the teaching profession, we would like to express our gratitude and appreciation to each teacher who is constantly developing themselves through the CPTD-IS reporting system and the SACE women in leadership authors. You inspire and set as a model for credible teaching profession!

This was followed by Ms Tuzana Sophethe shining a spotlight on those teachers whose exceptional dedication to lifelong learning and professional growth accomplishments were acknowledged.



SACE Professional Development and CPTD-IS

How do you earn CPTD points?

The policy framework envisages that teachers will in future engage in endorsed professional development activities for which they will earn professional development (PD) points over successive rolling three-year cycles. An electronic management information and communication infrastructure (CPTD-IS) will support the efficient operation of the CPTD system. The South African Council for Educators (SACE) will manage the CPTD system with the support of the Department of Education. SACE will endorse PD activities on grounds of their fitness of purpose and quality, and in so doing ensure that professional development is purposeful and effective.

Roles of CPTD Provincial Coordinators (PC)

The main function of CPTD Provincial Coordinators is to assist the Professional Development Division to implement, advocate, monitor and evaluate the CPTD Management System at the Provincial Level.

They work collaboratively with the Provincial Education Department and Stakeholders in coordinating, managing, and facilitating the CPTD management system at provincial, district, and school levels. Assist with the process of developing and reviewing professional development training and support material. The CPTD assistant manager in managing educator training and development activities in the province, supervise, develop, and provide ongoing support to the SACE resource persons and training officers. The PC plays a major role in advising and providing support to educators and stakeholders on CPTD-related matters, to solicit members' views/feedback about the usefulness of the Professional Development activities. They provide educators with information on endorsed Professional Development activities available on the database, points earned, and any other information they may want to know. Coordinators receive and analyse the manual professional development points received by providing support to teachers and stakeholders.



They attend to educators' queries and enquiries while participating in the provincial educational structures that deal with educational matters related to activities of the professional development programme and sub-division. They attend stakeholder's conferences, and meetings to advocate the CPTD Management System and implementation. Other provincial coordinators share the same districts and municipalities.

Provincial Coordinators handle all CPTD-related queries from schools, educators and providers while coordinating provincial stakeholder meetings. They write, edit, and analyse reports and make recommendations for further improvement and development. Lastly, they provide advice on available SACE-approved providers and endorsed professional development activities.
